

Public Policy

A new California AAUW subcommittee has been formed, led by Charmen Goehring, for the purpose of training members in the art of lobbying and advocacy. Public Policy is a major focus of AAUW CA and an important part of this focus is our contact with attorney Shannon Smith-Crowley, our effective lobbyist for legislation on issues regarding women and girls.

On December 14th 4 members of CHAR - Lee Battershell-Baird, Mary Duval, P.J. Missman and Mary Toutonghi joined 16 other AAUW members from branches all over Northern California on a tour of our State Capitol. This was followed by additional information provided by Lobbyist Smith-Crowley that was extremely useful. We were directed toward our individual legislators' offices and encouraged to go and introduce ourselves to the staff, sharing information about AAUW Public Policy Priorities. Fortunately we had some handouts to this effect which we were assured would "definitely be brought to the attention of our legislators." It was an excellent opportunity to learn first hand what their particular positions and interests were. We received cards with addresses to their district offices which could be used to schedule follow up visits. Getting to know them and having them get to know us was a crucial step in the process.

We may be learning to use social media ie twitter in order to be able to respond more quickly to notification of impending bills. This is definitely an "action" committee though study is a necessary component. Resources on the tried and true techniques of advocacy may be found under Public Policy on the AAUW website. "How To Guides" on organizing, advocacy, media, social media, and getting out the vote are available. Our lobbyist is an especially knowledgeable and encouraging mentor.

I would encourage anyone who is interested to consider joining this sub-committee.

P.J.Missman, Mary Duval, Lee Battershell-Baird, and Mary Toutonghi. AAUW information was distributed to various offices..

Discussion and plans were made for the Women's March in Sacramento on January 21, 2017. At this writing, eight members will participate.

There are changes coming, and we need to continue the fight to support Title IX's civil rights protections.



As we approach the 45th anniversary of Title IX in June 2017, AAUW is assessing the recent efforts of the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) and evaluating the tremendous positive effect it's had in the past eight years with enforcing this longstanding civil rights law.


"For decades students and advocates have called on OCR to enforce long-standing Title IX statute, regulations, and Supreme Court case law concerning sexual harassment and violence, protections for pregnant and parenting students, equity in career and technical education, athletics, transgender students, and more," said Lisa Maatz, AAUW's vice president of government relations. "OCR's recent report documents what students and advocates already know: Under the Obama Administration and Assistant Secretary Catherine Lhamon's leadership, this OCR steadily increased technical assistance and enforcement and provided critical guidance to schools, which led to better outcomes and safer climates for students at every level nationwide."

OCR plays a critical role in promoting and ensuring equity and fairness in educational settings, as well as addressing violations of students' civil rights that can seriously undermine a student's access to an education.

"This generation of women, girls, LGBTQ, students with disabilities, students of color, and survivors of campus sexual violence will reap the benefit of greater understanding, application, and enforcement of Title IX, which has positively affected academic results and resulted in safer environments for all students," said Maatz. "Students demanded this change, schools asked for additional clarity, and OCR answered the call by ensuring that schools and colleges implemented many of these changes. It's a new day, and we will never go back."
