California Issues

THE MARSHALL PLAN AND CALIFORNIA WATER

Colonel Marshall wondered why California residents did not use its abundant water supplies to irrigate acreage that would produce billions of dollars' worth of crops, making it "the world's greatest garden. His proposal to move water from northern to southern California was unveiled in 1919 but lay dormant until 1931 when State Engineer, Edward Hyatt identified the facilities and economic means to accomplish the north-to-south water transfer. However, the depression made the needed revenue bonds unmarketable. Finally the Federal government took it over as the Central Valley Project, a public works project to provide jobs.....

Serena was a product of the Foster Child program who has truly overcome. In addition to caring for her family and getting a degree, Serena volunteers as a firefighter, serves on the board of directors for a Buddhist nonprofit group, works with the ARC Model United Nations Club and the Student Senate. Serena is a member of the ARC Phi Theta Kappa.

Kalisa is a 4.0 student working toward a degree in Administration of Justice while working full-time and raising her Type One diabetic son as a single mom. After obtaining work experience using her Associates Degree, she will return to complete her transfer units and transfer to a CSU. Kalisa volunteers as an advocate for youth with mental illnesses in the Sacramento Probation Program. She works in food banks and clothes closets to support the homeless.





Maria, began college at ARC in 2015 where she is majoring in General Science and maintains a 3.44 GPA with the goal of becoming a nurse practitioner. Public Policy—Mary Toutonghi



Greetings from Priest Lake, Idaho, Land of Forest Fires and Smokey Skies!

I discovered a great movie at the Priest Lake Library last week—*Hidden Figures*, with Kevin Costner and a terrific cast. If you haven't seen it I do highly recommend it. The film follows a trio of NASA mathematicians and engineers, all black women, during the early '60s launching of the rocket to the moon, carrying astronaut John Glenn. The movie is based on the book by Margo Lee Shetterly. Kevin Costner portrays the director of the project, Katherine Goble Johnson, mathematician, Dorothy Vaughan, mathematician/ supervisor and Mary Jackson, who becomes an engineer. It is a not to be missed, informative and inspiring film.

Women's Equality Day celebrated on Aug.26th, marks the anniversary of the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment, which granted women the right to vote. However, many women remained disenfranchised after the amendment's passage in 1920. So while this day is one to commemorate, it is also one to reflect on the shortcomings of the amendment and to remind ourselves of the work that remains to be done before full equality becomes a reality, particularly for women of color, low-income women, and women with disabilities.

Title IX, which AAUW and other advocates for women worked hard to get passed, guarantees equal access to federally funded higher education programs and a safe educational environment free of discrimination regardless of gender. Women now outnumber men at most institutions and are receiving the majority of degrees at all levels: associate degrees since 1978, bachelor's degrees since 1982, master's degrees since 1987, and doctoral degrees since 2006.

But women still face challenges in college: the large gender gap in engineering and computing fields, and disproportionate student loan debt, a burden that follows them when they leave college, AAUW's 2017 report **Deeper in Debt: Women and Student Loans** details the extent to which women are more likely than men to take on student debt while in college and hold more debt by the time they finish.
