Lisa Culp is the founder and executive director for Women's Empowerment, and the tenants would be graduates from her group's program, which helps homeless women learn or relearn working and living skills. A long-time volunteer with Women's Empowerment, Mohanna said she was inspired to develop micro-unit projects in recent years as the region's housing shortage has grown more acute. Lisa said "Even though this is a stretch for our mission, we felt compelled to do this."

# Blue Ribbon Commission on the Establishment of a Sacramento County Women's Commission

On 23 July 2019 the Sacramento Board of Supervisors unanimously approved the creation of a Blue Ribbon Commission (BRC) to look into the necessity for and feasibility of a Sacramento County Commission on the Status of Women and Girls. Representative Phil Serna said "This Blue Ribbon Commission will explore the important issues facing women and girls in Sacramento County and the value of a permanent women's commission to help promote gender equity and equality. We look forward to the activity and work of the Blue Ribbon Commission and to receiving its advisory report....The purpose of the Blue Ribbon Commission would be to determine and establish best practices for the "structure, role, value and responsibility" for the proposed Commission. The BRC has 9 to 12 months to complete its task.

CHAR member and head of the BRC, Erin Saberi said that "...with this vote today the women and girls of Sacramento County now have a public forum for voicing their concerns, identifying their needs and exploring ideas

for effective county response." Beginning

in 2018, the group sponsored community meetings, facilitated polling, and hosted a series of "How Are The Women & Girls Listening Circles" with women and girls across the county. Issues such as domestic violence, living wage, housing, mental health, access to transportation and rapidly rising poverty rates consistently arose as areas of concern in each of these venues.

The BRC kick-off meeting was December 2, 2019, at the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors on 700 H Street, Sacramento, Hearing Room 1. The purpose of this meeting was to: 1) provide an overview of the mandate of the BRC; 2) present a draft BRC work plan; and 3) provide background about the work of Sacramento For Women & Girls. The second meeting will be Wednesday 12/18/19: 4:00 pm - 6:00 pm at the Impact Foundry to pair women with work groups and establish a plan of action for each work group. The goal is to provide an interim report to the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors in advance of the March 8 International Women's Day, and to provide a final report Tuesday 7/21/20.

Erin and her Sacramento for Women and Girls group will provide monthly updates in the Ripples—stay tuned.

### Get Ready for 2020!

2020 is upon us. It is going to be an eventful year... We will celebrate the 100th anniversary of women getting the right to vote, as well as the most important election in our lifetime where issues that matter the most to us are at risk. Primary elections are coming up March 3. Now's the time to begin planning at the branch level how to address these activities in our communities. Women who vote can influence the outcome of an election!

What opportunities should be considered?

**Voter Registration**. AAUW CA is well positioned to undertake voter registration, especially with our college/university relationships. Millennial women are an important target group. Research shows that a lack of information on the candidates and a lack of policy debates on issues of importance is the main reason some millennial women don't participate in the election process, and may not even register to vote. Get involved by organizing a <u>voter registration drive</u> in your community or on your local college campus. Don't forget: a successful voter registration drive must be a compliant one! Be sure to review the AAUW Guide to GOTV Dos and Don't's on the national website (<a href="https://www.aauw.org/resource/aauw-election-dos-and-donts/">https://www.aauw.org/resource/aauw-election-dos-and-donts/</a>).

**Voter Education**. AAUW aims to increase women's political influence and educate voters on issues that are important to women and girls. These targeted efforts help increase the number of women voting. Consider sponsoring nonpartisan issue forums, perhaps collaborating with another organization such as the League of Women Voters. Perhaps you have a vacancy to be filled in the primary election, so consider a meet-the-candidate event or debate, and invite all candidates to give their positions on AAUW's key issues: **Equal Pay for Equal Work. Investing in Education. Reducing Student Debt. Strengthening Social Security. Implementing Paid Leave.** And certainly consider doing this before the November election.

This is just a start, but early planning will ensure greater success! Don't hesitate to ask our AAUW CA Public Policy Team for assistance!

The primary function of the Ombudsman Program is to represent the interests of public safety for all Californians with a special interest in addressing the concerns of senior drivers. The Ombudsman can assist as a "go-between" to ensure that senior drivers are treated fairly, consistent with the laws and regulations, and with the dignity and respect they deserve. The Ombudsmen are available to assist in individual cases, as well as participate in outreach seminars for large and small audiences to promote driver safety in California with an emphasis on senior issues.
