



THE 38TH STATE, VIRGINIA, SAID YES TO THE ERA, WHICH MEANS AMENDMENT 28 SHOULD BE PART OF THE US CONSTITUTION SAYING WOMEN ARE EQUAL WITH MEN. WE ARE STILL FIGHTING THOSE WHO WANT TO KEEP WOMEN DOWN. On Thursday, February 13, in a historic step for women, the House voted to

remove the 1982 deadline to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment, 232 voted for 183 voted against. Now, we watch as the bill goes to the Senate—will the bill make it out of Senate committee to the floor.

As for CHAR, this February Liz Jordan, Sacramento, updated us on efforts to recognize the 28th Amendment allowing equality among the sexes. We have a new Ripples editor, Jean Kohloff. Our four-member committee Roberta Schmalz, PJ Missman, Pat Boyd, and Charmen Eberwine are putting finishing touches on our 501c3 application We established the bank account and finalized the contract with Sacramento County to manage their \$10,000 grant to CHAR for our Blue Ribbon Commission for Women and Girls—Erin Saberi says thank you-- Mary Duval and Joyce Furraggio. Tech Trek, is in a position to select candidates for summer Tech Trek Camp and are formulating what our Tech Trek Alumni program will look like. We are halfway ready for AAUW-CA Conference, highlighting Days for Girls led by Karen Wilkes (we do need donations, see p. 6). AAUW @ ARC Student Club President, Samantha Brady attended Karen's training session to help our Students prepare hygiene kits, and we have the information needed to go forward with our fundraising plans. It's exciting!!! I'm looking forward to welcoming new officers and new members that our nominating committee (Pat Boyd, Shirley Chang Janice Chung, Gwen Houk, and Noreen Rademaker) have identified who will infuse new energy into our programs.

Vern and Shirley are the personification of traits we value in our members. True support-

ers of CHAR's mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research, they open their home regularly to prepare and assemble Days for Girls Hygiene Kits and to raise funds for AAUW-Funds through Mahjong games. Thanks to Shirley's efforts CHAR more than doubled its contributions to AAUW-Funds.

Throughout Shirley's CHAR career she has helped establish our Local Scholarship Program, the award-winning Nursing Home Directory, the science center gardens, and more.

At the beginning of this year we heard we might have to cut back on our philanthropic efforts because we couldn't afford all we wanted to do, but that was before Vern. Vern joined CHAR and is providing his expertise and experience to help build a funding plan that will allow CHAR to provide greater funding for ARC scholarships, for Tech Trek, for our new AAUW @ ARC Student Club, for the

ARC paid Intern program, for Days for Girls that provides hygiene kits allowing girls and women to attend school, to work, and to contribute. Vern breathes new life into CHAR fundraising.

Vern grew up in Hawaii, and Shirley, in

Missouri. They met in Kansas City while Vern was working at Westinghouse and Shirley was going to school and working. They married August 13, 1955, became parents of three, grandparents to seven, and greatgrandparents to eight. The George Washington Honor Medal will be presented at the Roseville Timber Creek Ballroom by the Freedoms Foundation. It is a national, non-profit, non-partisan, non-sectarian educational organization. Since 1949, Freedoms Foundation has bestowed the Honor Medal on 57,000 people they believe are exemplars of responsible citizenship.

In addition, Karen was recently selected by Roseville AAUW to receive their "Women of Distinction Award" March 12, 2020, 5.30 pm at the Union Brick Event Center, 240 Conference Center Drive, Roseville.



YOU'VE COME A LONG WAY BABY ... BUT YOU'RE NOT THERE YET!

Perhaps many of you will recall the Virginia Slims advertising slogan from the late 60's, "You've come a long way, Baby." This slogan aptly fits the rise of the feminist movement in America which most of us agree dates back even before the Seneca Falls, NY convention in July 1848, but we will start from Seneca Falls.

August 26, 2020 will mark the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, the culmination of the Women's Suffrage Movement. It took over seven decades starting from Seneca Falls for a woman's right to vote to be guaranteed as the law of the land.

Since then, we have seen successive waves of the Women's Rights movement. Activists in the 1960's and '70's sought equal rights and opportunities along with greater personal freedom for women, similar to the goals of the suffragists, the first wave of feminism. This second wave of feminism also encompassed every area of women's experience -- including politics, work, the family and sexuality. Major legislative victories were accomplished during this period: the Equal Pay Act, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, Legalization of birth control for married and unmarried couples, Title X Family Planning Program, Title IX, the Rove v Wade decision and passage of the ERA.

Third-wave feminists sought to question, reclaim, and redefine the ideas, words, and media that have transmitted ideas about gender, gender roles, womanhood, beauty, and sexuality, among other things; while Fourth-wave feminism refers to a "resurgence of interest in feminism that began around 2012 and is associated with the use of social media." The focus has been on justice for women and opposition to sexual harass-

ment and violence against women. The movement is "defined by technology," according to a British feminist, and "is characterized by social media tools that challenge misogyny and further gender equality." Issues include street and workplace harassment, campus sexual assault and rape culture. Scandals involving the harassment, abuse, and murder of women and girls have kickstarted movements such as the "Me Too" Movement.

Where will feminism go from here? We've still got our work cut out for us as well as some unfinished business, namely the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, which has now obtained approval by the requisite 38 states, and faces court challenges or perhaps a legislative solution, one being that the 38th State approval was after the deadline. The House voted to remove the 1982 deadline to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment, 232 for, 183 against. Now we watch as the bill goes to the Senate—will the bill make it out of Senate committee to the floor? The US Senate of the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) did ratify CEDAW, the international bill of rights adopted by the United Nations in 1979. AAUW has played a notable role in all these waves of feminism and I am sure will continue to do so as we strive for social and economic justice-- because we're not there yet.
