Single Parent Scholarship Research Study Executive Summary

This Research Study records the positive results of the American River College Single Parent Scholarship student outcomes. With Dr. Greene's approval, this program was implemented with the full cooperation and support of the ARC Staff (Kirsten Dubray and Debra Hildreth - Philanthropy), and AAUW CHAR (Lee Battershell - President).

ARC enrolls an average of 1,700 single parents each year. National norms show that only 28% will complete a degree, 60% will live at the poverty level, and 40% will drop out due to child care costs.

To assist the Single Parent in their pursuit of an education, AAUW CHAR/ARC awarded 73 scholarships since 1987 with a total program value of \$50,300. The majority of these funds were raised through member donations, endowments, and AAUW fundraisers.

In 2020, AAUW CHAR/ARC invited all of the prior scholarship recipients to report their educational outcomes through the AAUW CHAR website (AAUWCHAR.COM) online survey. 12 responses were received.

The following report shows excellent outcomes when compared to national norms:

- No dropouts vs. 40% national dropout rate.
- 92% acquired a degree vs. 28% national graduation rate.
- 90% had child care support vs. a 40% national dropout rate due to child care costs
- 20% at poverty level vs. 60% national poverty rate.
- 80% are gainfully employed
- All children under 18 were at the correct grade education level vs. the national average loss of 2/3 years toward a HS diploma.

Henceforth, this research study will be continued annually to acquire a larger database of student outcomes.

National Norm:

"28% earn degree vs. 40% married moms"

Student Outcome Data:

- 92% (11 of 12) earned 19 degrees.
 - (12 AAs, 5 BA/BS, and 2 Masters)
 - Avg GPA = 3.72
- 6 of 11 were first in family to earn a degree.
 - 3 had 3.9/4.0 GPAs, and became managers (Budget Analyst, HR Manager, Professor).
 - 2 are teachers (Instructional Design, Art).
 - 1 is student teacher (Will earn AA in 2021).



<u>National Norm</u> <u>"60% live at poverty level"</u>

Student Outcome Data...

- 80% of Single Mom families (8 of 10) are above the poverty income level.
 - 2 families (for 2) are below \$21,720,
 - \circ 5 families (for 2) are above \$21,720,
 - 3 families (for 6) are above \$35,160).



National Norm: "40% drop out due to child care"

Student Outcome Data...

- No Dropouts
- 90% (10 of 11) had access to family support
- Did not pay for child care.



National Norm:

"The Single Parent Child Receives 2/3 Years less education"

Student Outcome Data

- 32 children were reported:
 - All 13 children below age 18 were at the correct grade level.
 - 15 children over 18 were at college level,
 - 4 over 18 were not reported.
 - Parent modeling behavior had a positive effect on education.



National Norm:

"Did You Have a Language Barrier?

Student Outcome Data

- 3 of the 11 had a language barrier and overcame them.
 - 1 student is a registered nurse, is a year graduate student, and has a balanced life,
 - 1 student is student teaching,
 - 1 student is home bound due to covid 19).



National Norm: "Did You Reach Your Target Job?"

Student Outcome Data

- 8 of 10 are gainfully employed and living above the poverty line:
 - 6 have met their goal,
 - 2 are employed temporarily,
 - 1 is unsure of her plans,
 - 1 is sidelined by covid.


